KUMBLE SUBBASWAMY

**Chancellor | Tenth Year at the University of Massachusetts
Bangalore University, '69**

Kumble R. Subbaswamy became the 30th leader of UMass Amherst July 1, 2012. He has emerged as a popular and well-regarded chancellor for his pursuit of academic excellence, promotion of research and outreach, and initiatives aimed at addressing campus climate, diversity, and culture.

Chancellor Subbaswamy has overseen the opening of new cutting-edge campus facilities, including Commonwealth Honors College Residential Community, the Integrative Learning Center, the Life Science Laboratories, South College, Worcester Commons the Football Performance Center, and the newly renovated Student Union Building. He has made sustainability a campus priority and is focused on strengthening community relationships, supporting area communities, and increasing access to the university's rich academic and research resources.

Championing an open and transparent leadership style, Subbaswamy enacted a comprehensive campus-wide strategic planning process to continue to build on the successes of UMass Amherst in the coming years. Under his leadership, the university continues to move up in the national rankings, making the campus one of the fastest rising top-tier public research universities in the country. As part of fortifying the future, Subbaswamy also played a key role in UMass Rising, the \$300-million fundraising campaign, the largest in campus history.

Subbaswamy has instituted plans to improve the UMass educational experience by introducing more opportunities for undergraduate research experiences and integrative and team-based learning. His priority is also to increase the enrollment of students from low-income communities. Under his tenure, the campus's status as a research powerhouse that touches—and often transforms—communities in the state and around the world continues to grow.

A physicist by training, and an elected Fellow of the American Physical Society and the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, Subbaswamy has spent almost his entire professional life at public research universities. Before coming to Amherst, he served as provost at the University of Kentucky since 2006. A physicist, he joined Kentucky's faculty in 1978 after serving as a post-doctoral fellow at the University of California, Irvine. During his first 18 years at the University of Kentucky, he served as associate dean of arts and sciences and as chair of the Department of Physics and Astronomy.

In other administrative positions, Subbaswamy was also dean of the College of Arts and Sciences at the University of Miami from 1997 to 2000. Then he left to become dean of arts and sciences at Indiana University Bloomington, serving until 2006 when he moved to Kentucky. He holds a bachelor's degree in science from Bangalore University, a master's in physics from Delhi University, and a PhD in physics from Indiana University. His primary research area is the optical properties of novel materials and nonlinear excitations. He has published more than 60 articles and coauthored a book on the local density theory of polarizability.

RYAN BAMFORD

**Director of Athletics | Sixth Year at the University of Massachusetts
Ithaca, '00**

Ryan Bamford was named the seventh permanent Director of Athletics in the history of University of Massachusetts athletics on March 24, 2015. In his first five-plus years at the helm, Bamford's impact and influence on the progress and growth of UMass athletics have become beacons for the university and Amherst communities.

Since he arrived in western Massachusetts, Bamford has led an influx of revenue generation driving the athletics department budget from \$34.2 million in 2015 to over \$40 million five years later. To help UMass compete among Division I FBS programs in a constantly changing athletics landscape, early in his UMass tenure Bamford negotiated lucrative long-term partnership agreements with Adidas and Learfield/IMG.

The department's greatest financial metric for success under Bamford has been in fundraising. Bamford's leadership has led to unprecedented fundraising growth for the Minutemen Club, resulting in the highest five-year fundraising total in department history. During Bamford's tenure, fundraising efforts have blossomed from \$1.62 million (FY15) to over \$5.0 million (FY21) while increasing the number of donors by more than 130 percent. UMass has raised nearly \$30 million –

including the largest cash gift in athletics history – over the last five years.

He created the first-ever AD Leadership Council which raises \$150,000 in unrestricted funds annually. From 2019-2021, the department generated more unrestricted cash from philanthropy than any two-year period dating back to 1996-1998.

UMass's athletics success under Bamford has not been limited to fundraising. Twelve of the 21 athletic programs (57%) have won at least one team or individual league championship since 2015. In April 2021, the men's hockey program won the 2021 NCAA Division

I National Championship with a 5-0 win over St. Cloud St, just the third national title for UMass and first since 1998. The 2018-19 hockey team also reached the NCAA national championship game, three years after Bamford named Greg Carvel head coach of the Minutemen.

UMass has won more conference regular season and tournament sports championships than any Atlantic 10 Conference member from 2015-2020. Additionally, the men's lacrosse (CAA) and ice hockey (Hockey East) programs have also claimed multiple league crowns during Bamford's tenure.

In August 2019, Bamford unveiled the department's strategic vision for the future of UMass Athletics. A collaborative two-year process reimaged the department's mission, vision, core values, and four strategic priorities: Educate, Win, Inspire and Invest.

Bamford's recruitment of top-level head coaching talent, including men's basketball (Matt McCall), women's basketball (Tory Verdi), hockey (Greg Carvel), and football (Walt Bell), has elevated the department's coaching roster and bodes well for the future of each sport program.

- In just his fifth season at UMass in 2020-21, Carvel's hockey program captured its first Hockey East tournament championship and first NCAA national championship. The 2018-19 team won the program's first Hockey East regular-season championship and reached the NCAA national championship game for the first time in team history. That year Carvel was the Spencer Penrose Award winner, given annually as the CCM/AHCA Division I Men's Ice Hockey Coach of the Year. Sophomore defenseman Cale Makar was unanimously named the Hockey East Player of the Year and became the first player in UMass history to win the prestigious Hobey Baker Award.

- McCall's 2020-21 men's basketball program recorded its best finish in the Atlantic 10 (fifth place) since the 2007-08 team finished third.

- In Verdi's fourth season at UMass in 2019-20, the Minutewomen secured their highest seed in the A-10 tournament since 2005-06, won 20 games for the first time since 1995-96 and hosted an Atlantic 10 Championship game for the first time in 22 years. In 2020-21, the Minutewomen lost in the A10 Championship game and earned a berth to the WNIT, winning multiple post-season games for the first time in program history.

- After his first season rebuilding the program in 2019, Bell's first full recruiting cycle secured 25 signees, including 19 during the December signing period. It is the highest-ranked signing class in program history according to 247Sports and featured 22 three-star signees. Also, the football program has recorded the two highest NCAA Academic Progress Rate (APR) scores in program history under Bell.

Under Bamford's watch, the football program has transitioned to an FBS Independent with 12-game regular-season schedules set through 2026. Future opponents include road tilts with Florida State, Texas A&M, Penn State, Iowa, Auburn, and Georgia and agreements for home-and-home contests against Missouri, Mississippi State, Army, and New England rivals Boston College and Connecticut. Additionally, in 2019, UMass and FloSports began a two-year agreement that provides live and on-demand coverage of Minuteman football games, which also air throughout New England on the NESN family of networks.

Several other programs have enjoyed unprecedented success over the last five years. Women's indoor track and field (2016, 2020), men's lacrosse (2018, 2019), rowing (2015, 2017), men's soccer (2017), tennis (2017), women's lacrosse (2015, 2016, 2017, 2018, 2019, 2021), field hockey (2015, 2016), and men's swimming & diving (2016) have all won regular season and conference tournament titles since Bamford arrived in 2015.

UMass's impressive performances in competition are matched only by its prowess in the classroom.

A record 247 student-athletes named to the dean's list in fall 2019 with a semester GPA above 3.5 average with 43 earning a perfect 4.0 GPA. Nineteen of the department's 21 programs hold a cumulative GPA over 3.0. In 2018-19 and again in 2019-20, the department earned its highest all-sport Academic Progress Rates of all-time, earning UMass additional revenue distributions from the NCAA.

Bamford has also spearheaded facility upgrades for every UMass athletics facility, totaling more than \$50 million. Massachusetts has made considerable investments to increase revenue generation and upgrade its facilities, including videoboard enhancements at the Mullins Center, McGuirk Alumni Stadium, and Garber Field, and a centralized Video Production Suite in the Mullins Center for the department's Creative Services unit. Most notably, UMass christened the \$29.2 million Champions Center for the basketball programs in 2015 and the \$10.5 million indoor football practice facility – an air-supported bubble and turf field practice space – in 2019. The 240-foot wide by 400-foot long turf facility offers an expanded space for teams to practice. At the same time, the seasonal, air-supported dome provides the ability to work indoors during inclement weather and the winter seasons.

A \$2 million locker room renovation project for the hockey program is underway and funded entirely through philanthropy. The project will be completed in time for the 2021-22 academic year.

Furthering the student-athlete experience for the Minutemen and Minutewomen, a new 3,400-square-foot student-athlete lounge located in Boyden Gymnasium opened in spring 2016. The Bob and Marianne Foote Academic Success Center came online in 2018, with all academic services moving into a completely renovated facility.

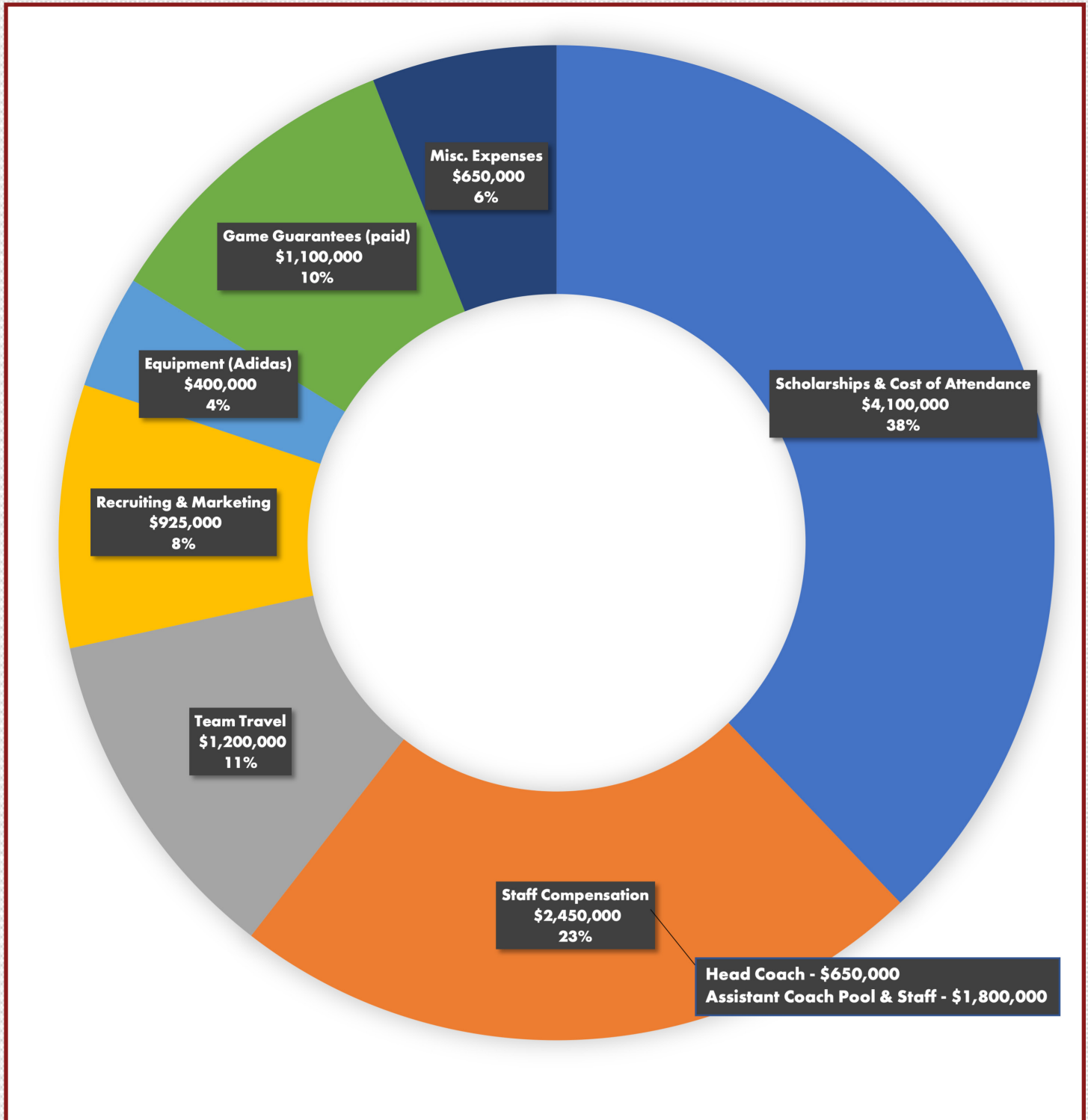
